West Chester police get traffic safety, enforcement grant

The police received an Ohio Traffic Safety Office award of \$6,422 to be used for traffic safety enforcement efforts. It will pay for about 100 extra hours of patrol during specific periods.

"Traffic safety is a priority all year long, but during the summer months when there are more celebrations and more people on the road, this grant comes at a perfect time," said Joel Herzog, police chief.

The hours can be used for traffic safety education and during the annual Click It or Ticket blitz, May 23 through June 5; Independence Day holiday, July 1-5; and the annual Drive Sober or Get Pulled Over campaign, Aug. 19 through Sept. 5.

As Rebecca and Doug Worples at Golden Dog Farm prepared their hives for the 2022 season, they painted the village royal blue and yellow and named each of the six hives: Peace, Love, Unity, Joy, Strength and Hope in support of the people fighting for their freedom in the Ukraine.

With Mt. Mansfield towering in the foreground, the Worples are also planting more than 25,000 sunflowers behind the bees which the bees will be able to pollinate and will offer people the opportunity in late summer to cut the flowers and take photos.

For a \$50 donation people can sponsor a hive and have access to learning about that particular hive. As Rebecca goes through the hives this summer she will offer inside information and will send a jar of honey from the respective hive to its sponsors. Virtual public forum – Refreshing the Park Board: Part 2

Woman's City Club's forum, "The Cincinnati Park Board: Time for a Refresh?" held in February, generated such interest and discussion that the panelists and WCC have scheduled a virtual follow-up program on Monday, May 16, at 7 p.m.

The first program presented the history of the 111-year-old Park Board and recent concerns about how it functions. Aside from several abrupt changes in personnel, proposals for development in parks have met with strong community opposition.

Expert panelists discussed questions about the structure, function, and priorities of the Park Board: Why and how does the mayor determine who should serve on the Park Board? How much authority should lay board members have over professional parks employees? What accountability should the Park Board have to the public it serves? Finally, what would be the ideal administrative system for the management of Cincinnati parks?

Part 2 will provide the audience with the opportunity for further discussion with the previous panelists and participation in polling on recommendations for refreshing the Park Board.

- Dr. David Stradling, Zane L. Miller professor of history, University of Cincinnati.

- Dr. Alyssa McClanahan, author of a history of the Cincinnati Park Board.

- Frank Russell, director of the UC Community Design Center and the Niehoff Urban Studio and former Park Board member.

- Steve Schuckman, superintendent and manager of the Division of Planning and Design, Cincinnati Park Board.

Festival returns to Music Hall this fall. The event, which has grown to be the largest coffee festival in the Midwest will be held Oct. 22-23 in the ballroom at Cincinnati Music Hall.

The event is a major fundraiser for Ohio River Foundation (ORF), a Cincinnati-based nonprofit with successful programs dedicated to protecting and improving the water quality and ecology of the Ohio River and its watershed.

The Ohio River Watershed stretches across 200,000 square miles, 11 states, and is home to 25 million people. ORF is the only regional conservation organization working to protect and improve the ecology of the Ohio River and its rivers and streams. Coffee has a natural connection to that mission.

The Cincinnati Coffee Festival is open to the public and will have a large variety of local and regional coffee roasters in attendance such as La Terza, Deeper Roots, and Carabello. Additionally, coffee and tea shops, bakers, pastry shops and chocolatiers will be on hand to showcase their goods.

Two Badin High School administrators are taking on new roles as the school transitions to a president/principal model for the upcoming school year.

Principal Brian Pendergest, a 1990 Badin graduate, will become president. Assistant principal Patrick Keating, a 2007 Badin graduate, moves to the principal's role.

In his new role Pendergest will direct fundraising, finances, facilities, faith life, and strategic planning. Patrick will oversee day-to-day school operations.

The changes were approved by the Archdiocese of Cincinnati, which oversees the Catholic high school.

The first project Pendergest faces is a proposed parking and multi-sport stadium complex planned for behind the school on New London Road.

Also on his agenda is development of a new strategic plan in the next year or two.

Enrollment has increased from 448 students in 2010 to 623 students this year.
